Great Wall Hobby 1/48th scale P-61B *Lady in the Dark*, Part 4 by Michael Praetorius



This is the fourth and final installment of my "work in-progress" for the P-61B Black Widow from Great Wall.

In the previous writing I had left the

decals and the glass to complete. My disappointment with the decals

continues and there is nothing for it but to complete the application. I have looked in to vendors advertising "Lady in the Dark" decals in the 1:48 scale format but when I explored the web pages,




they were either sold out or discontinued. There are any number of reliable P-61B Black Widow decals to be had with a wide variety of planes from Cutting Edge and others. But my fascination has always been with the nose art and history of my chosen aircraft.

The red night fighter lines were presented in a peculiar way. It may have been better (for me) to have provided a series of red lines, as Revell had, and have me cut them to size from there. As it is, the length and angles are laid out different than most references I have seen. It was still manageable and I proceeded to lay

them down. I experienced a number of tearing instances requiring patience in







As I had mentioned before, the decals are thick and look like they were printed on scotch tape. No amount of Micro Sol or over coating of Pledge (by brush) could remedy this problem. The stencils are accurate and appear to be the correct scale. The assembly and instruction callouts are easy to read and thorough.





My conclusions on the build are Great Wall has an exceptionally wellengineered model with exquisitely engraved panel lines, rivets, caps, and covers. The interior cockpit, crew areas, and flight deck have an amazing amount of detail. The included photo etched metal fret, although thicker than its Eduard counterpart,



provides detail for the engines, seat belts, dive brakes, and access hatch ladder that puts it over the top in my opinion. The instruction sheets are well illustrated and easy to follow and I found only one or two incorrect callouts. The canopy and cockpit masks are left wanting but certainly better than none. I did not investigate the availability of

alternatives. The fit of the parts as I stated in previous writings rivals Hasegawa or Tamiya.

Finally, I would, in good conscience, recommend this model with the caveat of purchasing after-market decals with which to finish. I recommend for moderately experienced builders. – *Michael Praetorius*

History In A Box

Never Surrender: The Last Holdouts of an Empire Shoichi Yokoi ~ Hiroo Onoda ~ Teruo Nakamura







Earlier this month, there was a brief snipet in the news media about the death of Hiroo Onoda – "the last Japanese soldier to surrender after WWII." In fact there were three long-lasting holdout Japanese soldiers: Sergeant Shoichi Yokoi (almost 27 years on Guam), 2nd Lieutenant Hiroo Onoda (almost 29 years on Lubang Island, Philippines) and Private Teruo Nakamura (almost 30 years on Morotai Island, Indonesia).

All three men hid in the jungles along with a few small bands of other Japanese soldiers following the end of the hostilities in 1945; some even continuing their fight against the Allies via guerilla warfare. Despite great efforts to convince the remaining Japanese soldiers the war was over, these men remained in hiding and continued to survive. Through the years, their fellow soldiers died, were killed or surrendered, leaving only these three men—each alone on their respective islands where they had been stationed between 1943 and 1945.

On January 24, 1972, Shoichi Yokoi was discovered and captured by two men checking their shrimp traps. On February 20, 1974, Hiroo Onoda was found by Norio Suzuki (who was traveling the world in search of "Lieutenant Onoda, a panda, and the Abominable Snowman, in that order") and on March 9, 1974 Hiroo Onoda was ordered by his former commanding officer, Major Yoshimi Taniguchi, to surrender. On 18 December 1974, Teruo Nakamura (also known as Attun Palalin) was arrested by Indonesian soldiers who had mounted a search for him after a pilot had observed Nakamura's hut from the air in mid-1974.

Yokoi died in 1997 of a heart attack at the age of 82, and was buried at a Nagoya cemetery, under a gravestone that had originally been commissioned by his mother in 1955, after Yokoi had been officially declared dead. Onoda became disenchanted with his perception of the decline of Japanese values, so he moved to Brazil and became a cattle rancher. In 1984 he returned to Japan to start the Onoda Nature School – an educational camp for young people, held at various locations in Japan, which taught survival skills to youth. Originally from Taiwan, Nakamura decided to be repatriated straight to Taiwan, bypassing Japan, and died there of lung cancer five years later in 1979.
