Gary brought a very nice collection of Studebakers that included a 1956 Hawk, a 1951 Commander by French kit company Provence Moulange, a 1962 Hawk GT, and a 1954 Land Cruiser. Mark showed his original issue 1/32 scale Revell P-40E. Mark said he is using this kit to model a shark's mouth onto the nose. Now, most of us are likely familiar with the shark's mouth painted on the nose of this aircraft, but will be sculpting it 3-D! That should get some attention. Mike Steenstra, who again allowed the use of his home for the meeting, showed his 1/35 scale Dragon King Tiger and StuG IV as well as his 101st Airborne figures bazooka. 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

All of the painting was finished and all I had left was final assembly of my latest and greatest masterpiece. Except... Why won't this V8 settle down into the chassis? No wonder it won't fit. My excitement was gone.

This still wasn't my worst modeling struggle. That came a few months back. My project then was the comical Hasegawa F-16 eggplane. I had a hard time getting the fuselage glued together right off the bat. Not because of the kit, but because every time I looked at it I broke out giggling. Everything went together beautifully right up until I airbrushed a coat of metallizer paint on the fuselage. A couple of days later when I pulled it out of my drying box I saw that the paint was foggy looking. I was so upset I set it aside for several months. When I decided to have another go around I stripped the old paint and shot gray. It went on great as did the gloss coat. The decals laid down excellent. The dullcote looked great when I pulled it out of the drying box a week later. All that was left was to install the perfectly painted pilot and canopy. That was when I dropped it.

It took me thirty minutes to find all of the broken pieces. Out came the CA and the tedious job of reassembling it began. I had it back together and hopefully no one would ever be able to tell what Page 6 Sprue Bits

happened. I was almost done when... I dropped it again. I wish I was kidding. Nope, this time I didn't find all of the parts.

Discouraged yes, defeated no. I scratch-built my own replacement parts and though not even close to show worthy I display it proudly alongside my fleet of F-16's.

I hope your modeling goes smoother than mine but if it doesn't, laugh it off and keep building. After all, mistakes and accidents are excuses, not good excuses, but excuses none the less to work even more on or beloved models.
