

Model building is a seasonal pursuit... or at least that is what those higher up in the industry tell me. Model building as well as model railroading takes place primarily in the winter. Personally I like nothing better on a hot, humid oppressive summer day than to sit inside with the air conditioner and every ceiling fan in the house going to keep me cool while I build a model or work on my railroad. Instead I usually find myself out in my sweltering hot shop working on one of my remote control vehicles or at the track racing them. Summer is racing season and I have little time for modeling.

This year has been a lot different. The wet spring and early summer we experienced cancelled a lot of racing on the weekends. I could still spend ever waking minute in the shop working on my race R/C's but this year I haven't. Happily this summer I have been getting a lot of modeling done.

I even found time to clean up my hobby room. It looks a lot neater and I am having far less trouble finding things. Plus I have no more fear of that stack of unfinished models toppling over on me anymore. Okay so now I can't open the spare bedroom window because of all the unfinished model boxes stacked in front of it but there are two windows in that room anyway. Besides by the time I want to open the window for good weather I'll have the stack worked down to nothing, right?

Maybe not. I have some sort of terrible modeling disease as yet unidentified in which I have a terrible urge to open a brand new model and start building the second I have it home. Hours, days, or even sometimes minutes later I reach a point that stops me cold and back in the box it goes; to be added to the dreaded unfinished stack. By then I have one or more new models and 'Oh Boy!' I can't wait to start them!

I've made progress this summer though, slow gradual progress. I nearly finished a Jeep Rubicon that will be part of a diorama. The diorama base is up to the point of ground cover and water, the Jeep is merely lacking wheels and tires.

I painted my Thunderbirds F-16 eggplane; unfortunately I got excited about trying out Tamiya spray cans and painted it the wrong color. My next project was stripping the paint off my Thunderbirds F-16 eggplane.

I worked hard at spraying a beautiful Pennzoil yellow paint job on a new Camaro only to have the clear coat wrinkle it like an old man too long in the bathtub. I stripped the Camaro paint. I repainted the Camaro again and had another type and brand of clear wrinkle that finish too. I stripped the Camaro paint, which I am getting really good at. I put it aside for now, you know in the unfinished pile.

I started to decal an old Monogram SR-71 and not wanting to take chances with the very old decals I clear coated them with decal specific spray. Now the decals are so thick they will not conform to anything but a mirror flat surface. Nothing and I mean nothing will cause them to bend and settle on the surface.

I am still working on the MOSS pirate ship club build... enough said.

I tried a new CA glue specifically for clear plastics only to see it turn a visible portion of a clear windshield milky white.

Oh, and I started several new models.




Michael Steenstra



In 2004, Nate was hired as a career Firefighter with Branson Fire Rescue. In 2006, he was promoted to Engineer on the Truck Company, and has served in that capacity since then.



History In A Box

The Invasion of Poland (September 1– October 6, 1939)

The Invasion of Poland by Germany, the Soviet Union, and a small Slovak contingent that marked the beginning of World War II in Europe. The operation was also known as the September Campaign, the 1939 Defensive War, or Fall Weiß (Case White).

The German invasion began on 1 September 1939, while the Soviet invasion commenced on 17 September. The invasion of Poland led Britain and France to declare war on Germany on 3 September. However, they did little to affect the outcome of the September Campaign. No declaration of war was issued by Britain and France against the Soviet Union.

The campaign ended on 6 October with Germany and the Soviet Union dividing and annexing the whole of Poland. Poland was divided among Germany, the Soviet Union, and Slovakia. About 65,000 Polish troops were killed in the fighting, with 420,000 others being captured by the Germans and 240,000 more by the Soviets (for a total of 660,000 prisoners). Up to 120,000 Polish troops escaped to neutral Romania, and another 20,000 to Latvia and Lithuania, with the majority eventually

making their way to France or Britain. Most of the Polish Navy succeeded in evacuating to Britain as well. German personnel losses were less than their enemies (~16,000 KIA).

None of the parties to the conflict—Germany, the Western Allies or the Soviet Union—expected that the German invasion of Poland would lead to a war that would surpass World War I in its scale and

cost. It would be months before Hitler would see the futility of his peace negotiation attempts with the United Kingdom and France, but the culmination of combined European and Pacific conflicts would result in what was truly a "world war." Thus, what was not seen by most politicians and generals in 1939 is clear from the historical perspective: The Polish September Campaign marked the beginning of the Second World War in Europe, which combined with the Japanese invasion of China in 1937 and the Pacific War in 1941, formed the cataclysm known as World War II.
